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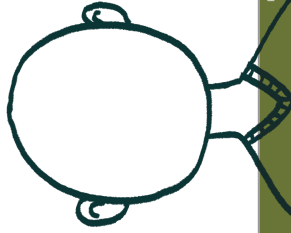

Chapter 4

"I think at Buck Merrill's place. There's a party over there tonight. Dally said somethin' about it this afternoon."

Buck raised a few quarter horses, and made most of his money on fixed races and a little bootlegging. "Well, wait a sec and I'll see what I can do about this mess." Then he took a good look at me. "Ponyboy, are you wet?"

"Y-y-yes-s," I stammered through chattering teeth.

"Glory hallelujah!" He opened the screen door and pulled me in, motioning for Johnny to follow. "You'll die of pneumonia 'fore the cops ever get you."

He half-dragged me into an empty bedroom, swearing at me all the way. "Get that sweat shirt off." He threw a towel at me. "Dry off and wait here. At least Johnny's got his

"Here!" Dally handed me a shirt about sixty million sizes too big. "It's Buck's--- you an' him ain't exactly the same size, but it's dry." He handed me his worn brown leather jacket with the yellow sheep's-wool lining. "It'll get cold where you're going, but you can't risk being loaded down with blankets."

I started buttoning up the shirt. It about swallowed me. "Hop the three-fifteen freight to Windrixville," Dally instructed. "There's an old abandoned church on top of Jay Mountain. There's a pump in back so don't worry about water. Study: Yellowstone shows signs of shorter timeline for an eruption

A supervolcano underneath Yellowstone National Park might one day erupt again. If it does, it could happen with far less warning time than previously thought.

Yellowstone National Park is huge. It covers 3,472 square miles, which is larger than the states of Delaware and Rhode Island combined. Most of the park is in the state of Wyoming, but small parts of it stretch into Idaho and Montana. Yellowstone is notable because it was the first national park. It also sits right on top of a huge active volcano. The volcano is so large it is sometimes called a supervolcano.

Scientists at Arizona State University studied ash from the most recent big eruption. They think the supervolcano last woke up after two floods of fresh magma flowed into the area beneath it.

About 630,000 years ago, a strong eruption shook the region. It spewed rock and ash and created the Yellowstone caldera, or crater. The crater is 40 miles wide.

The new study offered an unsettling twist. It shows that the changes to make the volcano erupt may have built up in a matter of decades. Until now, scientists had thought it would take hundreds of years for the supervolcano to make those changes.

A 2013 study showed that the area of magma that feeds the supervolcano is more than twice as large as previous estimates. Scientists also think the magma is drained after every monster blast. So they thought it should take a long time to refill. Based on the new study, it seems the magma can return quickly. That means the volcano could explode sooner.

“It’s shocking how little time is required to take a volcanic system from being quiet and sitting there to the edge of an eruption,” Hannah Shamloo said. She helped write the study.

Still, Yellowstone is one of the most-watched volcanoes in the world, says Michael Poland. He is the scientist-in-charge of the Yellowstone Volcano Observatory for the U.S. Geological Survey. Sensors and satellites are always looking for changes, and right now, the supervolcano does not seem dangerous.

No Immediate Eruptions Forecast

"We see interesting things all the time," says Poland. However, his team hasn't seen any sign of an upcoming eruption, he says.

Today, Yellowstone National Park owes much of its beauty to its volcanic past. Wonders like the Old Faithful geyser and the Grand Prismatic Spring draw huge crowds. The natural features came from what has happened below the park. That activity is driven by the magma that feeds the supervolcano.

A long-ago eruption left behind the Lava Creek Tuff. It is a deposit of ash that Shamloo and fellow scientist Christy Till studied. They presented the results of their study in August. The pair also presented an earlier version of their study at a 2016 meeting of the American Geophysical Union.

Experts think the supervolcano has had at least two other huge eruptions in the past 2 million years or so. The supervolcano has been largely quiet since before the first people arrived in the Americas. A handful of smaller rumblings have occasionally filled the crater with lava and ash. However, they have not been recent. The last one happened about 70,000 years ago.

In 2011, scientists revealed that the ground above the magma was bulging. It stretched up to 10 inches over about seven years.

The rising ground is unusual because it covers such a large area, Bob Smith said at the time. He is an expert on Yellowstone volcanoes. Smith works at the University of Utah.

Deep Magma Pool Dispels Fears

The swelling magma pool causing the rise of the crater was very deep. As a result, it did not create immediate worry, Smith said. Still, the crater’s gentle “breathing” helped scientists learn more about the supervolcano’s behavior.

Most scientists who study Yellowstone’s slumbering supervolcano say that there is no way to know when the next big blast will come. The U.S. Geological Survey puts the yearly chance of another

huge Yellowstone blast at 1 in 730,000. That's similar to the odds of a huge asteroid seriously damaging Earth.

Luckily, there are many eyes on Yellowstone's supervolcano. They'll keep watching for any signs of a coming blast.

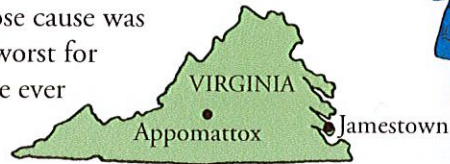


General Lee told his officers April 8th that there was nothing left for him to do but go and see General Grant—adding, “I would rather die a thousand deaths.” He sent a messenger with a white towel, and Grant accepted the surrender offer.

Lee went to meet Grant dressed in his finest uniform and carrying his engraved sword because he expected to become Grant’s prisoner and wanted appear his best.

General Grant’s officers wept at the surrender offer. As for Grant, he suddenly felt free of a headache he had suffered since early morning.

Grant considered Lee a valiant foe but one whose cause was “one of the worst for which people ever fought.”



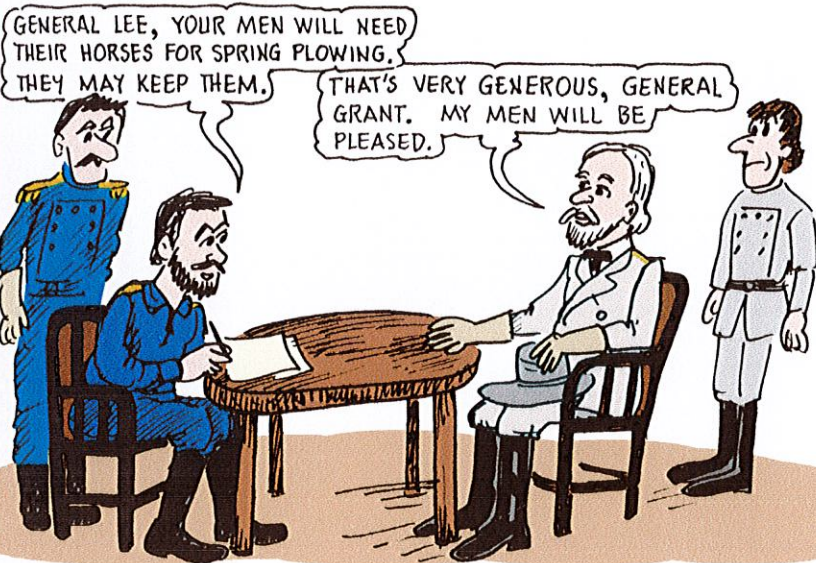

UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER—MAGNANIMOUS TREATMENT

Lee and Grant met in the home of Wilmer McLean. Ironically, McLean had moved to Appomattox to escape the war after having the first Battle of Bull Run fought in his back yard.

Under Lincoln’s authority, Grant gave unconditional terms of surrender, along with generous concessions.



Grant told Lee: “Peace being my great desire, there is but one condition I would insist upon...that the men and officers surrendered shall be disqualified for taking up arms again, against the Government of the United States.”

Then, enacting Lincoln’s policy, Grant added one of the most humane conditions in military history. After signing paroles, the Confederate soldiers were free to go home and were “not to be disturbed by the United States authorities.”

Thus, there would be no imprisonment or punishment of Confederate soldiers, including Lee. Neither Lincoln nor Grant wanted to punish the Confederate army.

LINCOLN, LEE AND GRANT: MODELS OF MAGNANIMITY

In one of history’s miracles, the United States would successfully reunite after four years of fighting—unlike some countries that hold post-civil war grudges for hundreds of years. Lincoln, Lee, and Grant were magnanimous in setting a policy and tone of reconciliation for their fellow Americans.

As Lee rode away following the surrender, Grant silenced Union cheers, saying, “The war is over. The rebels are our countrymen again.”

Lee swore allegiance to the United States, influencing thousands of his devoted ex-soldiers to do the same. He became president of Washington College in Lexington, Virginia (later named Washington and Lee University), where he told students: “Make your sons Americans.”

Lee once warned a professor to stop speaking disrespectfully of Grant, under penalty of being fired.

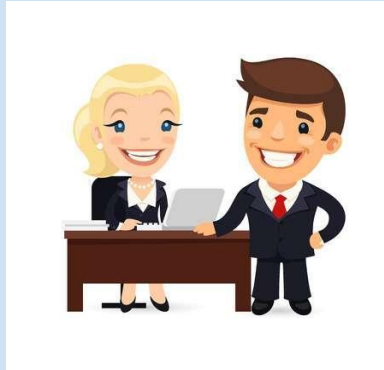

Are you prepared?

- Research the employer – go to their website and find out everything you can about their business and the industries they compete in
- Use salary sites such as Salary.com or Payscale.com to find the typical salary range for similar positions in your area
- Plan your answers. Have someone ask you practice questions.
- Create a list of questions YOU plan to ask – to show that you have researched the company and are interested in the position
- Practice talking about yourself briefly, covering such topics as education, accomplishments, skills and traits that would matter to the employer

MAKE A GOOD IMPRESSION!

- Arrive 5 minutes early
- Smile, make eye contact and shake hands when you meet your interviewer
- Answer each question honestly; try to stay positive and confident
- Ask for business cards so you can follow up if you do not hear from them within the timeframe they indicated.
- Send a thank you email to your interviewer within 24 hours of the interview to let them know their time is valuable to you as well as them and that you appreciate the opportunity to be considered for the position.

DRESS THE PART

- Shorts, tank tops and sandals are only appropriate if you are interviewing for a lifeguard or beach job
- Appropriate dress attire for the job – business casual works well unless you are applying for a professional level job. In that case, a suit and tie are better choices.
- Your shoes are as important as your clothes. Make sure they are clean.
- Shampoo / fix your hair. A simple hair style works well

CHILD LABOR LAW REQUIREMENTS IN KENTUCKY

Work hours of 14 and 15 year olds

- **During times school is in session**, minors of this age may not work during school hours.
- They are allowed to work up to three hours per day on school days, but this work must be between the hours of 7am and 7pm.
- The total hours per week must be 18 or fewer.
- **During the summer months (defined as June 1st through Labor Day)**, a 14 or 15 year old minor may work between 7am and 9pm. However, a minor of this age may still work no more than 40 hours per week or 8 hours per day during the summer months.
- minors under the age of 16 are prohibited from jobs operating many types of machinery, or working in any manufacturing settings.

Employment of 16 and 17 year olds

- **during the school year**, minors must work **no more than** 6 hours per day on a school day, or 8 hours per day on a non-school day
- During the school year, the total hours worked per week must not exceed 30 hours
- If he or she has gained a special exemption from both a parent and his or her school (such as for co-op), he or she may work up to 40 hours per week during the school year.
- **during the summer**, there are no restrictions on the number of hours per day or per week a 16 or 17 year old may work.
- A minor of this age may not work later than 10:30pm on a school night, or 1:30am on a non-school night.
- No minors under the age of 18 may work in dangerous occupations such as coal mining or logging.
